### Off-Leash Dish

Off-leash dog parks across the U.S. are gaining ground and public support, even with non-dog owners. Dog parks are the fastest-growing segment of city parks. The Trust for Public Land, the leading non-profit working to conserve land for people (and now dogs), acknowledges that this trend has the capacity to add significant power to the general park movement. Skateboarders have made inroads too, but the constituency of dog owners has much more clout, as the U.S. "dog economy" is estimated to total \$7.5 billion a year. Official off-leash dog parks on public land have a bumpy past. Illegal off-leash activities on a beach in Berkeley, Calif., in (continued on page 3)

flux. No-pet policies are increasingly being challenged and new luxury buildings are luring animal lovers with posh animal amenities. Seizing on NYC's liberal qualifications for needing service dogs ("physical, medical, mental, or psychological" impairments), tenants are increasingly going to their lawyers and doctors to get a diagnosis and documents stating their dogs are a big part of their prescription for well-being. Luxury buildings catering to the affluent canine include: The MiMA, in Hell's Kitchen, featuring

Dog City, with spa, treadmills, pool, massage, indoor and outdoor play, and home cooked meals; in Long Island City, a 41-story rental offers an onsite dog run; in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, a pet room.

 PUT THAT SCREEN PROTECTOR ON your lpad! There are many apps for your dog or cat to play. From chasing a pinpoint of light to images of fish or fowl, dogs and cats are giving these interactive games a rave review. Either by paw, nose, or tongue, your pet controls the game and moves up levels as it chases or tries to fetch the prey. Some trainers suggest that putting peanut butter on the screen (or whatever entices your furry friend to touch the Ipad) will help him learn how to play the game. There are even dog trainers giving 90-minute IPad clinics. From private entrepre-

neurs to big-brand Friskies, you can download these apps for a very small fee. • ENJOYING AUTUMN, Babette with two of her clients in the oasis of Central Park, There are 37.5 million human visitors to the park annually. That is more than seven times as many who visit the Grand Canyon.



# Off-Leash Dish

(continued from first page) the '70s led the way to legalizing the first official public dog park, in 1983, after much campaigning of local officials and citizens.

New York City's first public dog run, Tompkins Square Park Dog Run, was opened in 1990 as part of the renovation of the park. It also is

known as First Run, because it was the first of 55+ dog parks opened by the NYC Department of Parks and Recreation.

The first private dog run in NYC, Mercer-Houston Dog Run Association (MHDRA), had its genesis in the '60s. It is not on park land and requires membership tests and minimal upkeep fees.

On the corner of Mercer and Houston streets, now the chic tip of SoHo, dilapidated buildings were brought down by the Committee on Slum Clearance and Urban Renewal Plans. That left an empty lot, which was instantly used by owners for their dogs to run unleashed, as muddy and dirty as it was. Fifteen years later, they got permission to fence the area, with a double-entryway, and connect to water. In the '70s, when NYU received permission to build the Coles

The group fought the battle in 2006-07, saving the 9-9 policy for off-leash hours in parks like Cadman Plaza, Prospect, Central, and 90 others throughout NYC.

Gymnasium, the local dog owners' lobbying efforts paid off, as the university agreed to build and maintain a new adjacent dog run. The "leash cutting" of the dog run, constructed at an estimated cost of \$60,000, took place in 1980, and its official opening made the cover of the *New York Post*.

Now, New York City has the most public off-leash dog parks in the U.S., thanks to our pioneering dog owners! But per person, with our population of 8,391,881 and 138 dog parks, we only rank 14th, at 1.6 dog parks per 100,000 residents. (Oregon wins, with 32 dog parks in a population of 566,143, or 5.7 per 100,000 residents. Norfolk and Las Vegas come in 2nd and 3rd.) If you see an opportunity to create another dog park, on city, state, or federal land, you will get lots of support for your activism to bring NYC into the top ten!

### Where to Roam...



After 4 years of lobbying, this once-vacant lot in Hell's Kitchen became Astro's Dog Run, named after the beloved canine companion of the leader in the effort.

THIS SUMMER two major dog runs opened in NYC, the Washington Square Park George dog run and the Pier 26 run, with costs running in the hundreds of thousands. Whether at a city, state, private, or public dog run, the common denominator is community and volunteering, and usually some source of fresh water—besides a great offleash time for you and your dog. If joining a private dog run, minimal tax-deductible membership fees, key fobs, passcodes, orientations, and medical records may be the course for you and your dog. Here, and on the next page, are some of the dynamic NYC places to go off-leash.



Tribeca's Pier 26 Dog Run (shown on left) just opened! It cost \$400,000 and is the largest Hudson River run. The gray-blue pavement at the site is designed to appear vibrant blue through dogs' color-blind eyes. The run at Kowsky Plaza (right), Battery Park City, is named after 9/11 hero Sirius.

## Where to Roam...



#### Mercer/Houston Dog Run

Mercer & Houston Sts.

Nestled in a busy location, the first private dog run in NYC has an audience of tourists who photograph the dogs at play. Not many fixings, but I don't think the dogs care that much. They can run, and there is fresh water. The cost is \$60 per year, \$30 for owners who are seniors.

#### Canine Court at Van Cortlandt Park

West 252nd Street & Broadway, Bronx The run has an agility course, including a teeter-totter, hurdles, tunnels, and hanging tire specially designed for canines, as well as a big open field. After this workout, you can put on the leash and wander around 1,000 acres of the park.

#### **Washington Square Dog Runs**

West 4th St. & MacDougal St.

Just opened this summer, George's Dog
Run is for large and small dogs, with
benches, shade, and an energetic scene.
Nearby is the Robin Kovary Run for
Small Dogs. In 1987, Robin co-founded
the NYC Coalition for Dogs, which
aimed to establish enclosed, legal dog
runs throughout the city. She was VP of
the first legal, NYC-recognized dog run
in Manhattan (at Mercer and Houston),
was instrumental in establishing many
dog runs in Manhattan, and has assisted
communities elsewhere in the U.S.



#### Madison Square Park Dog Run

5th Ave. & 24th St.

This Shake Shack scene has a dog park with umbrellas, benches, poop bags, and the convenience of getting a shake for you and your dog. The dog menu at all Shake Shacks includes: Shackburger biscuits a la carte, 5 for \$7.50, and The Poochini, a cup of non-dairy custard with a biscuit and a swirl of peanut butter at \$3.75! Dogs are

not allowed on the grass, even on a leash, in this park, which has views of the beautiful Flat Iron Building and Met Life Clock Tower. Known to get muddy right after a rain.

#### Warren Street Dog Park

Warren Between West & Greenwich Sts.

This private dog park is pretty bare-bones yet good-sized, costing \$120 per year. Cleaning is not at designated hours, so

you may have to vacate unexpectedly. Even if frustrated, you are required to be courteous to the crew and exit. Children younger than 12 are not allowed.

#### West Village D.O.G.

Little West 12th St., between Washington St. & 10th Ave.
The private run has a \$75 member fee.
This summer brought a record number of applicants. The run has 24-hour lighting, soft asphalt paving, and all the amenities, including tennis balls.

#### 105th Street Dog Run

Riverside Park & 105th St. In 2012, users were dismayed at the rundown run. They worked with Riverside Park Conservancy to form a private formal "user group" of board members to raise awareness and funds for improvement. This committee fixed the gate, replenished the poop bags, got a lockable tool chest from the Park's Dept. for maintenance supplies, and ensured volunteer upkeep and donations with a twitter and Facebook account. So when a tree fell in June, destroying the fence, they got NYC and the Conservancy to remove the tree and put up a temporary fence in a very timely fashion, http://dogrum105.org/

Union Square Dog Park (U-dog run) Southwest side of Union Square Park
In 1996, dog owners, who had met every day at the park while bringing their dogs to play off-leash on a patch of grass, formed a community to pitch the Parks Dept. They succeeded in getting a fence. Today an estimated 150 owners bring dogs on weekdays—double on weekends. Neighborhood business donations and volunteer workers keep this run in shape.



Chelsea's dog run has good drainage and is a haven for hide and seek in the natural and man-made rocks.

#### Chelsea Waterside Park for Dogs

West 23rd St. & Hudson River: New York magazine says it's one of the best dog runs: modern, stylish and clean. Featuring special asphalt that stays cool.

#### Carl Schurz Park Dog Run

East End Ave. to the East River, from 84th to 89th Sts.

There are two dog runs. The ground is dirt for the large and hard for the 23-lbs.-and-under. This community's annual fund- and awareness-raising includes events such as the SCHMOOZE fundraiser, Halloween Howl, and Healthy Hound Fair. You can also take your dog on-leash to the movies here during the Conservancy's Sunset Film Festival.

#### Theodore Roosevelt Park-Bull Moose Dog Run

Next to the Natural History Museum, northwest side on 81st St., near CPW. This run, considered to be a random park next to the grand-daddy, Central Park, is on its way to getting an estimated \$500,000 renovation. Changing the dirt/gravel ground to K9Grass is under consideration, at an estimated cost of \$250,000+. It can be pressure-washed and sprayed with chemicals to dissolve waste. To curb the noise complaints (barking sounds intensify as they bounce off the museum), mitigation would cost roughly \$100,000. Also on the wish list is new lighting, for \$15,000, a new gate with a better lock, new benches, and a water play area. This summer Councilwoman Gale Brewer secured \$250,000 of NYC funds for the run. She was just elected Manhattan Borough President. I see even more dog parks in our future!
